As we look back at the year 2021, it is clear that this goal was achieved. Dukers such as Shalom Cumberbatch, Ramona Jones, Makena Sue and Khalisha Forde worked tirelessly with the SHAPE App, and Care Package initiatives. When the going got tough, award leaders such as Tricia Forde and Jennah Parris stepped up to the challenge. However, it must be noted that our award alumni were not to be left out. When more persons were needed to assist with the mass vaccination, Keisha Callender did not hesitate to volunteer. In sum, 2021 was a year of altruism.

It was also a year of change for the Award. After nine years of faithful service to the Award, Operations Manager Ms. Carla Alleyne demitted her post. However, Ms. Alleyne will remain an active volunteer within the Award. Moreover, for the first time in the Award Barbados' history, participants were able to complete their Gold Residential Project virtually. Scouts Lael Charles, Zachary Hoyte and Tashaun Callender were three participants who were able to do so in August 2021 while attending the 42nd World Scout Conference and the 14th World Scout Youth Forum.

The team came second overall, winning \$1,500 in investment towards their proposed social enterprise.

His Royal Highness Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, founder of The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award passed away two months before his centennial birthday. While dukers from across the globe mourned his passing, his legacy was honoured at the launch of the Challenge 100 campaign.

Locally, the Award also lost Mr. Richard Goddard, our longest serving chairman. Over the decades, Mr. Goddard had worked faithfully, building the Award's reputation in the eyes of the youth and expanding the Award on a regional level. Due to his efforts, the youth now experience CASC, an event that Mr. Goddard played a major role in planning and executing. Mr. Goddard's impact is surely felt, and he will be missed.


